Alexander I. Solzhenitsyn argued that

of good and, even in the best of hearts, there  
remained a small corner of evil. His  
conclusion was that it was impossible  
to expel evil from the world in its  
entirety, but it was possible to recognize  
it and constrain it. For Solzhenitsyn, the

God, an authority beyond himself.
