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




Fifty Years ... 1892-1942

When, in 1891, Seattle Seminary first opened its doors, few, other than its founders, realized that from these halls would go forth men and women into whose hearts had been instilled that which would enable them to be a blessing in every walk of life.

For more than twenty years, under the leadership of Rev. Alexander Beers, it was known as Seattle Seminary. In 1910 college work was introduced, and in 1915 the name was changed to Seattle Pacific College. But with the change of the name there was no change in the spirit of the institution which grew rapidly under the guidance of Dr. Orrin E. Tiffany, the successor of President Beers.

In 1925, President C. Hoyt Watson took over the helm, and for more than fifteen years he has worked with us—as one of us; and now in this, the fiftieth year of its existence, we, the students of S.P.C., face the future, as others have in the past, with that something in our lives which will enable us, even in a war-torn world, to overcome, to conquer—through Christ, our Captain.




Inspiring Music




Zylstra Scores for the Falcons




Fifty Years ... 1892-1942


The Class of '42








Hearts God Hath Touched . . .
