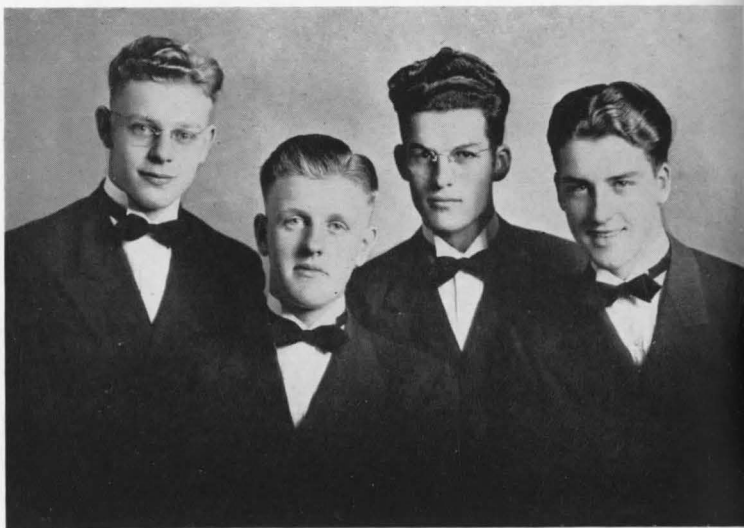

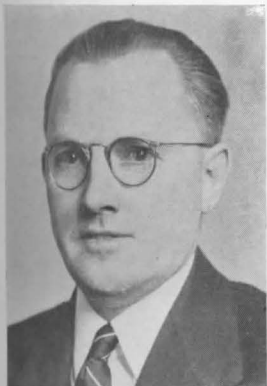
### SYMMETRY OF PERSONALITY

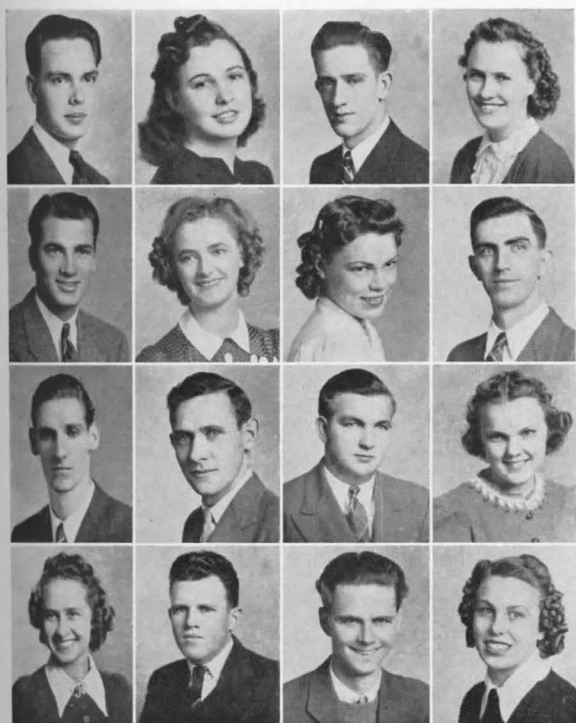
## The Spirit of '42

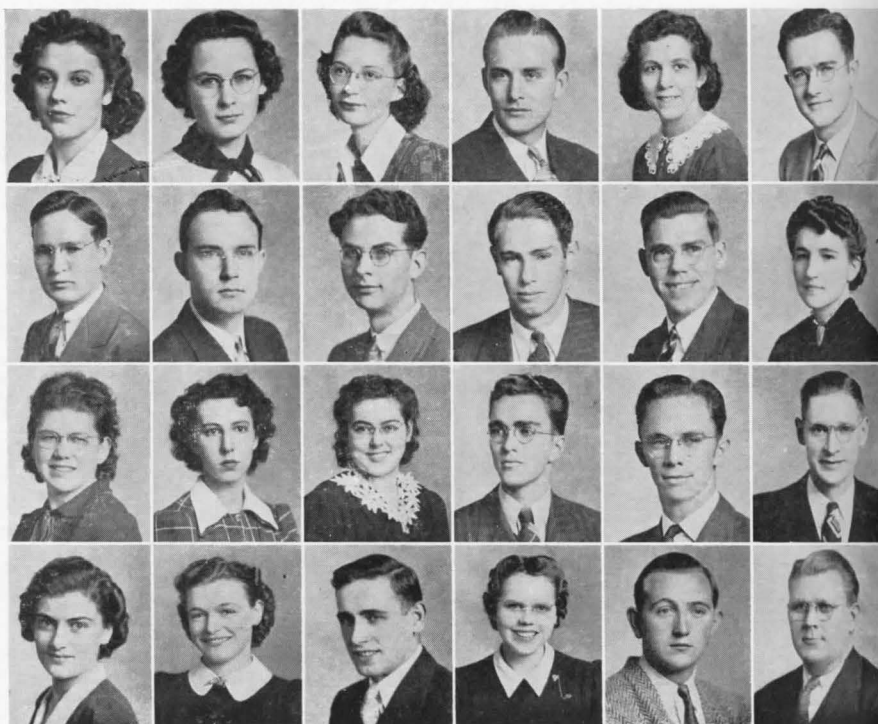

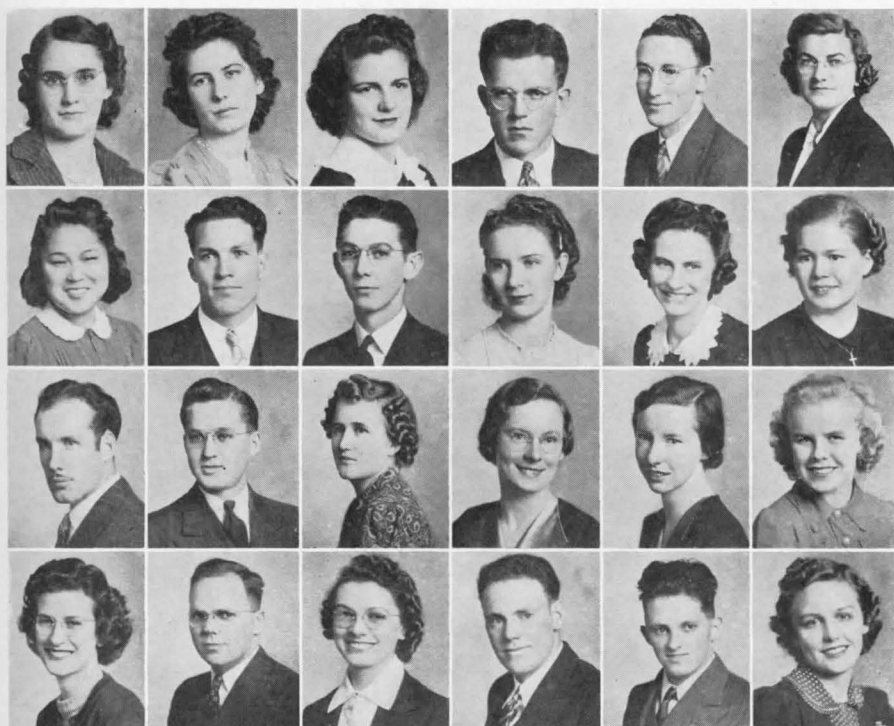

Something comparatively new for most of the class was the ice-skating party held in cooperation with the Freshmen.

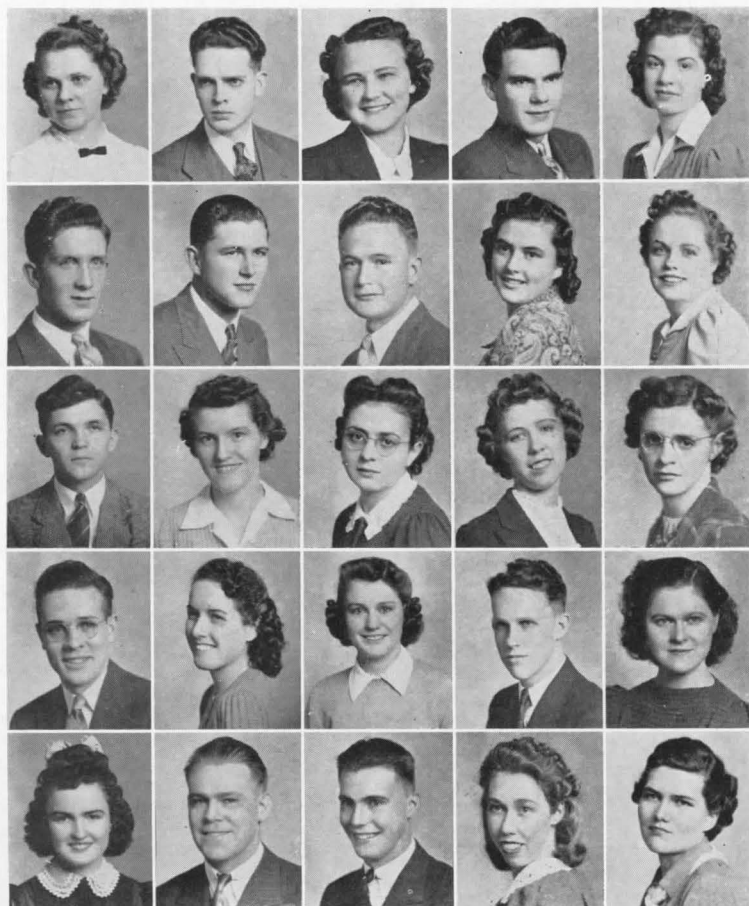
Following up last year's class records of intra-mural basketball championship, five fellows played for Varsity, and the class team again took first place in this field.

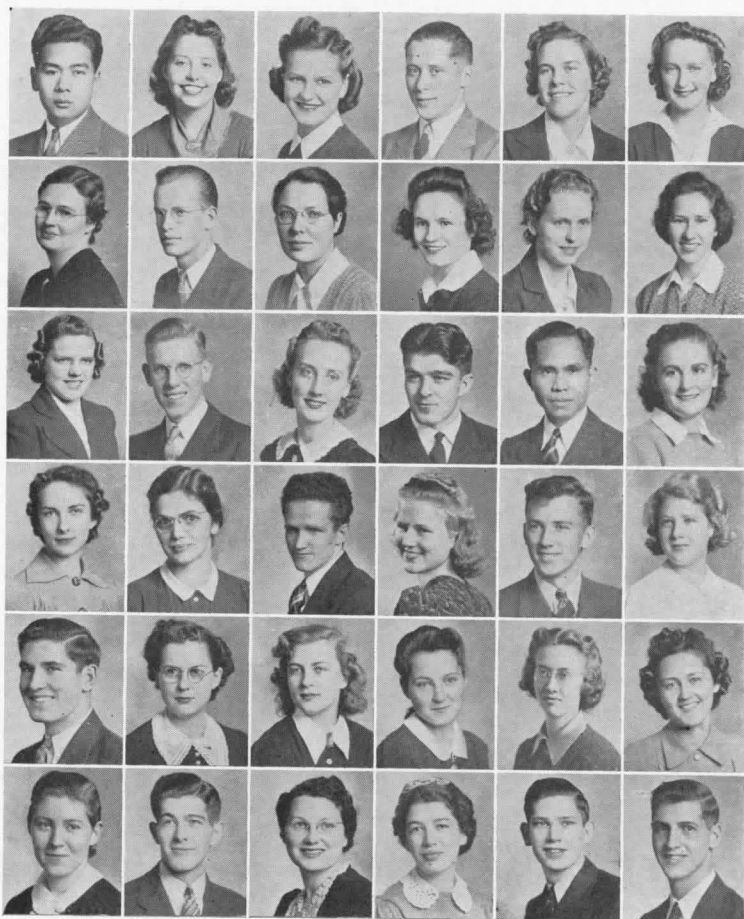


## *The Campus Elementary School*

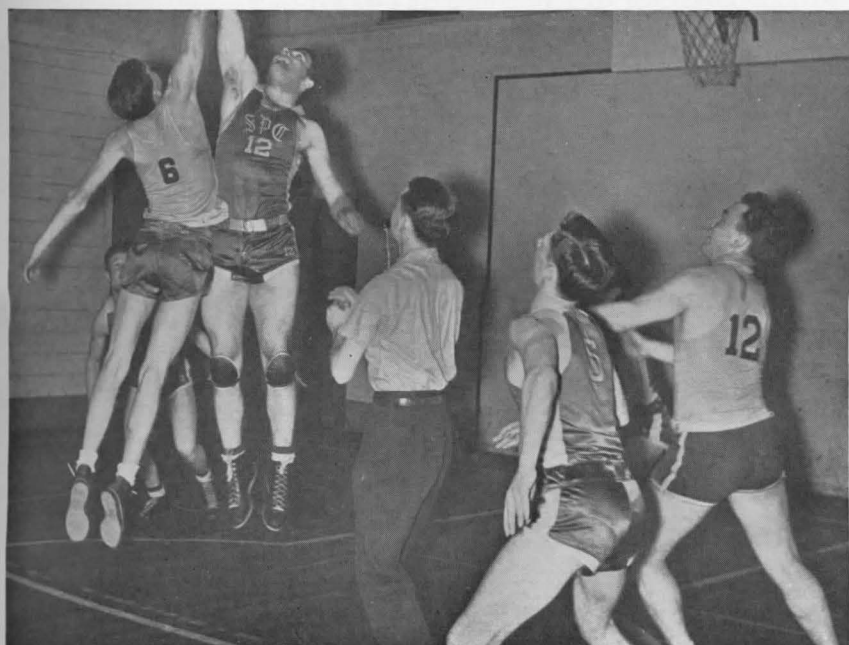

After losing all but two of last year's team—Turnidge and Petrie—Coach Hart started again from the bottom and built an aggregation which out-matched many highly touted quintets.

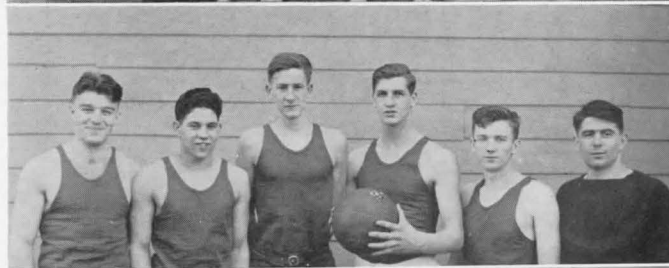

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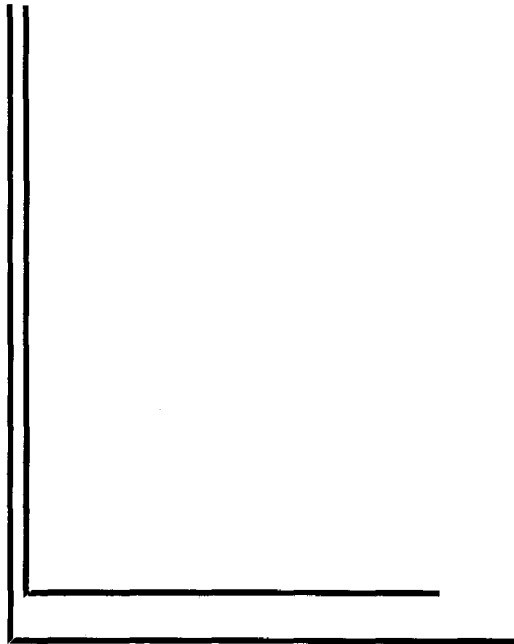

## *Falcon Staff*

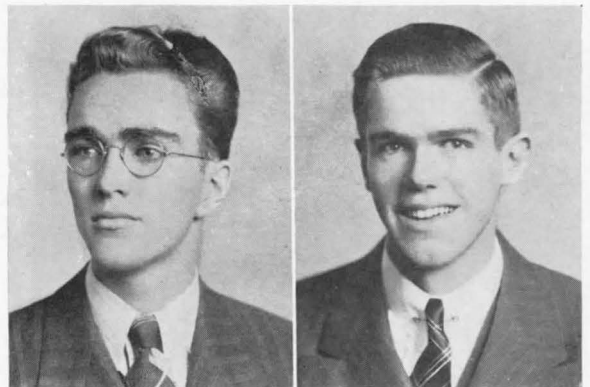
