GENERAL INFORMATION.

OWNERSHIP.

The Seattle Seminary is the property of the Free Methodist Church, and is conducted by a Board of Trustees elected by the Washington Conference. It is under the special patronage of the Pacific Coast Conferences.

LOCATION.

The Seminary is located at Ross, a suburb of Seattle, Washington. It has the advantages of the quiet country so favorable to student life, and yet it is in the reach of the city libraries, lectures and markets.

The tide-waters of Puget Sound can be seen from the grounds. The magnificent scenery of the Puget Sound country can scarcely be surpassed in the United States. The climate is exceedingly equable and healthful, as well as pleasing.

There has not been a case of serious sickness in the school.

BUILDINGS.

The main building is of brick, substantial, commodious and well adapted to the needs of a school family. Spring water is carried by pipes to the highest story, and hot and cold water are supplied to kitchen and bathrooms. This building is heated by furnaces and lighted by electricity.

GIRLS' HALL.

During the past year, a beautiful and commodious two-story building has been erected on the Seminary campus, for the young ladies. This building is heated by hot water, lighted by electricity, provided with porcelain bath and marble wash-bowls, and is strictly modern in every particular.

BOARDING DEPARTMENT.

As heretofore, the boarding department will be conducted on scientific and hygienic principles. All students coming from abroad will be expected to board with the Faculty in the Seminary building, unless other arrangements are made with the Principal. This arrangement brings each student in wholesome contact with the teachers.

GOVERNMENT.

The government of the school is what should be expected in any well-regulated Christian home. Love and kindness are the ruling elements in the school.

Seattle Seminary is in *no sense a reformatory*. All bad habits, such as smoking, chewing, the use of profane and vulgar language, must be given up as a condition of becoming a student. As this is a Christian school, simplicity of dress will be encouraged.

FACULTY.

The Faculty is composed of teachers of experience and thorough educational qualifications. They are of fixed Christian principles and can be depended upon to do conscientious work.

BIBLE STUDY.

The object of the founders of this school was to provide a place where young people might secure a thorough education under Christian influences. With this end in view, the Bible will be given a prominent place in all our work.

Every student will be expected to do systematic work in Bible study.

LITERARY WORK.

The Alexandrian Literary Society and the Philopolemic Debating Club have been organized and successfully conducted by the students.

Regular literary work is required of each student.

ARTICLES FURNISHED BY STUDENTS.

Each student furnishes one pillow, three sheets, two pillow-slips, comfortable and blankets, white bedspread, towels, soap, napkins, clothes-brush, shoe-brush, umbrella. Rubber coats are very desirable for both

boys and girls in bad weather of fall and winter. All articles should be plainly marked with owner's name. Students will have their own laundrying done.

PAYMENTS.

Tuition is payable in advance; board, one-half term in advance. Students are expected to comply with these conditions or make satisfactory arrangements before entering upon their studies.

Students are not received for less than one-half term. No deductions are made for tardiness at the beginning of a term, for absence, or for departure before the close of the term, except in case of protracted illness, when a reduction of one-half will be granted.

All money for board and tuition will be paid to the principal.

COURSES OF STUDY.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

Careful attention will be given to students in this department. They will be received and classified according to their degree of advancement.

INTERMEDIATE DEPARTMENT.

The studies of this department are Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar, Geography, U. S. History, Physiology, English Composition and Civil Government.

Students are expected to pass satisfactory examinations in each of the foregoing studies before entering either of the courses of the Academic department. The New York State Regents' Examinations have been adopted as the standard.

Certificates entitling the holder to admission to either of the higher courses will be granted to all who complete the work of this department.

Three courses of study are open to students who have completed the work of the intermediate department. The Classical Course prepares for entrance to college.

The Scientific Course includes more of science instead of the studies in Greek found in the Classical Course. The Christian Workers' Course is intended for those who wish to spend a short time in preparation for Christian work. Special advantages are offered to those who are preparing for foreign missionary fields.

REGULATIONS.

1. Cheerful obedience to each member of the Faculty, quietness in the building and courtesy in behavior will be required of all.

2. Each student will be expected to keep his own room in proper order, and have due regard to neatness in person.

3. Students will be held responsible for injuring or defacing the buildings, furniture or other property, and will be required to pay all expense incurred in repairing such damage.

4. Language or conduct unbecoming to a Christian school will not be allowed.

5. Students are expected to attend religious services on the Sabbath. Those boarding in the building will be expected to attend services at the Seminary twice on the Sabbath and once during the week.

6. Visitation between the sexes will not be allowed except in places designated for general social interview.

7. When Students desire to leave the Seminary grounds, permission must be obtained from the Principal or Preceptress.

8. All students will be expected to observe regular study hours outside of school sessions.

9. Match games of baseball and all games of chance are prohibited.

10. At the close of the school year, students will be expected to return home at once, unless satisfactory arrangements have been made with the Principal by the parents.

11. All books and other reading matter brought into the school are subject to the inspection of the Principal.

12. Resident students must present written excuses for absence from regular school sessions.
